#### Latinx and the News

- Latinx individuals are dying at nearly <u>twice the rate\*</u> of White Americans from COVID-19
- On June 18, 2020, the Supreme Court ruled that the Trump administration's attempt to end DACA in 2017 was unlawful.
   The fight is not over. The administration can try again to end DACA through executive action.
- On July 28, 2020, DHS announced changes to DACA including the rejection of new first-time DACA applications
- Asylum seeker applications have been paused, and the DOJ and DHS are proposing to abdicate the US of its legal obligation to protect those seeking refuge
- ICE's attempt to end international students' visas was withdrawn, even for students taking all remote courses
- The 2020 census will not ask about citizenship, but the Trump administration may work to compile citizenship information in <u>other ways</u>
- Police brutality disproportionately impacts Black and Brown communities
- Ecuadorian couple Julio Mora (110) and Waldramina Quinteros (104) officially hold the record for the world's oldest married couple

## Summer 2020 Outreach Highlights

- Offered webinars and skill trainings, focusing on self-care and trauma prevention, to over 350 staff members at Latinx serving organizations in Multnomah and Washington County
- Conducted charlas covering varying emotional and mental health topics via Facebook live in collaboration with community partners, which have reached over 6,000 people worldwide since April
- Attended Latinx collaborative network meetings and town hall meetings via zoom to advocate for the mental health needs of the Latinx community, demand PPE for migrant farmworkers, and address state policies that negatively impact the Latinx community
- Created Spanish language psychoeducational videos on YouTube which have been used and shared by our community partners and posted on the Washington County Human Services Department website
- Created a Rapid Response Team to address the mental health needs of uninsured and low-income individuals affected by COVID-19 through a community grant awarded from Providence Health & Services to the Sabiduría emphasis
- Implemented a new program, named conversaciones con los abuelos, matching students with Latinx older adults who are experiencing significant isolation during COVID-19. Students support their abuelos through weekly check-ins, evaluation of basic needs, and providing social connection and support.

"Working in the community and alongside community members also provides a glimpse into the **reality of the challenges and strengths** this community experiences and a better understanding for "where patients are at" once they enter the therapeutic setting to receive professional help. **Awareness of their day to day issues**, of how the systems impact community members, and the different avenues that exist to empower and lift marginalized communities has been obtained through **experiential knowledge** of doing this work"

"being part of the *charlas* has helped me as a future clinician because I have the opportunity to interact and work with people who have different views and practices than I do. As a Latina, this experience has opened my eyes as to how different our cultures really are, and that cultural sensitivity is far more than just language"
